

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VAIANA - BOOK REVIEW

It was not a usual practice for the film to precede the book, but the Walt Disney Company has brought many changes on the market. Vaiana, also known as Moana or Oceania came into the world in 2016 as the product of Taika Waititi's imagination, the woman who wrote the initial screenplay for the film.



Vaiana lives in the village of Motunui and is the daughter of the Chief Tui. She is expected to become the next leader of her tribe and to respect the traditions of her elders. She is brought up by her parents and grandma. Somehow their ideas contrast: while her father tells her that she should never leave the reef because nothing good awaits her out there, grandma her encourages her to listen to her heart and venture out of her comfort zone in order to accomplish what others fear of attempting.

Grandma Tala is the only one who keeps on retelling the story of Te Fiti, Te Ka and Maui. Te Fiti was the beautiful goddess who protected their village and brought wealth and happiness upon its inhabitants. Maui, an infatuated demi-god, stole the heart of Te Fiti and tried to run away with it hoping to bring immortality upon the humans. He had to confront Te Ka, a demon of fire and earth, who defeated him and sent him into exile. Vaiana's mission is to find Maui and convince him to join her into her quest: they need to find Te Fiti's heart and bring it back to her.

Vaiana proves to be courageous and persuasive. Her efforts are successful and she becomes a great leader for her people who have nothing to be afraid of anymore. Te Fiti blesses the lands again for the crops to grow, while Maui's place is re-established in the hero-arena. Vaiana's father admits to his error of judgement and the people go out to explore the ocean.

VAIANA - FILM REVIEW

Apparently, Vaiana's initial story suffered a lot of alterations during the filming process, which is not something new for the Walt Disney Company where the magic happens. You cannot possibly have so many well-engrossing animations if you do not

try to come up with something different every time. This time, the directors shifted the focus so that Moana might no longer be preoccupied with proving her worth in a men's world, but rather go on a quest of her true self.

Many of the modern films have renounced their pretentions to put on screen fantasist love stories of princes and princesses. These days, the tendency is to adopt a psychological approach of old myths, legends or fairy-tales and analyse the struggles of the heroes who go in search of the meaning of their existence.

Maui is certainly not a prince or hero in the traditional fashion and, although he has a flirty



way of talking, he does not seem particularly interested in conquering or saving the princess. On the other hand, Vaiana is by far a modern version of a princess who does not wine like a damsel in distress but prefers to take the matters in her own hands and move on even when her partner, Maui, gives up. When their journey ends, Vaiana goes back to her people to rule them wisely and bravely, while Maui chooses to fly away freely, enjoying his fame as a hero of humanity.

Of course, the film was a great success and it brought a lot of money to its producers. It bears three different names, according to the countries it has spread. Lately, most of the Disney animations end up being put on paper and sold as story books. It happened to *Moana*, too. So you may now find it in its both forms. Whichever of the two you manage to get, enjoy it!
